

At the beginning of a new year, my article will have two main purposes, to report on Mission Giving in 2019 and some changes that need to be made for 2020. Our total of Mission Giving for 2019 was \$32,985.33 or 82.5% of our total pledge of \$40,000. That is down from 2018 when we made 85% of our pledge. Our designated giving, which went to some great causes and our four Ohio national mission sites was \$10,033.73 for a total of \$43,01.26. I want to thank all of you for your hard work and support for the work of United Methodist Women. Unfortunately, there were thirty churches which are still on our list as having UMW groups that did not remit funds in 2019. I have asked our district officers to reach out to those churches on their Shepherdess lists to inquire as to possible reasons for that. I'd also be glad to hear from you concerning this matter.

As for 2020, there will need to be a few changes as to how and when you send me your giving. I did receive remittances from four churches after the 2019 deadline. Our conference treasurer graciously extended that deadline to mid-December though I like to have all funds by the end of November. I realize the World Thank Offering is not taken until November but that is still a full month to get the money collected and sent on. The biggest change will be in how local units can receive a Five Star Recognition. The five categories remain the same:

<u>PLEDGE TO MISSION</u>: The local or district group is responsible for agreeing on the amount of its Pledge to Mission each year. The minimum is \$1.00.

SPECIAL MISSION RECOGNITION: An individual, local or district can honor a special person with a certificate and pin. The minimum is \$40.00.

GIFT TO MISSION: A variety of Mission Cards are available to send to that special someone. The minimum is \$5.00. The cards come in a variety of greetings and they can be ordered from me.

GIFT IN MEMORY: Gift acknowledgment cards are available to send to a family or friend in memory of their loved one. The minimum is \$5.00

WORLD THANK OFFERING: Spontaneous additional gifts are given out of gratitude for God's abundance and in celebration of the joys of life. The minimum is \$1.00.

The total for the five categories is \$52.00. In the past those groups who have donated in just the Pledge to Mission category with at least this amount have received Five Star recognition. However, this will not be possible starting with 2020 giving. Each local unit needs to order a Special Mission Recognition pin to receive their certificate. Your group can designate a special person and their name will be on the accompanied certificate, or you did not need to name a person and the pin can be given to whomever you choose. It does not necessarily need to be a member of your unit. It has been given to gentlemen who have been very helpful in the work of United Methodist Women in your church. Perhaps you have a retiring officer or your pastor is leaving your church.

This is my first column as your CAS Program Resources Coordinator and I want to kick it off by sharing a very simple history of the UMW Reading Program and, for those of you who find history boring, I promise not to go on and on. Our Purpose states that we are to "seek God" as well as "expand concepts of mission". Now, I ask you, is there any better way to learn about God, develop a relationship with Him and learn about our global missions than to read about Him, His Church and His people? Our Reading Program has become an integral part of effectively sharing information concerning our four mission emphases (Membership, Nurture and Outreach; Mission Education and Interpretation; Social Action and Spiritual Growth). Participating in our Reading Program is an excellent way to begin to build new friendships, strengthen old ones and build community.

In some form, our Reading Program has been around for over a century. We had our first list of recommended readings and study for mission in 1870. As years passed, women were encouraged to create reading circles in EVERY church. The women were to read books on global missions and report back to everyone what they had learned. Over the years, with each denominational merger, a women's reading program was created.


Today, each year, we are provided a list of books in each of five major categories and we are encouraged to read at least one from each of these categories (Education for Mission, Leadership Development, Nurturing for Community, Social Action and Spiritual Growth). Some of these books are in large print, in Korean and Spanish and we also have many wonderful children and youth books. I can't exaggerate how my many grandchildren look forward to me bringing our Reading Program children and youth books for them to read or be read to.

To receive a Reading Program Certificate, you must read and report that you have read (using the appropriate form sent to the Program Resources Coordinator no later than the end of November each year) at least one or more books from each category. Books from this year's list and those for the five previous years qualify for recognition. This year, our Mission u study books are considered "bonus books" and count as 2 books. You can find these lists and reporting forms on the national UMW website. Program Resources on that site now carries only the Prayer Calendar, Program Book and Mission U Study Books as well as UMW free materials. The books on the Reading Program are usually available at our public libraries or may be ordered from Cokesbury, Amazon, Barnes and Nobles, etc. If you choose to order from Amazon, join their Amazon Smiles program and choose the United Methodist Women and then Amazon will donate 5% of the book cost to UMW. Also, keep in mind what a fantastic tool our *Response Magazine* is and take advantage of the "Faith Talks" podcast. You may sign up for them on our national web site. Also, remember that Mission u is coming up in July. The mission studies planned for 2020 are awesome.

Program Resources, continued

Unfortunately, for those of us who love to read, not every church has a reading circle. I thought it might be very helpful if those UMW organizations that are blessed to have a reading group would please share with me their information, including the contact information of the individual who is in charge so I may share the information with women who may want to participate in that part of your organization. They need not leave their local organization just to participate in another organization's formal reading program. That is what I chose to do because my unit, as wonderful as it is, does not as a group participate in the Reading Program and I love to read and love the books included in the Reading Program. I figure that if I can do it, there may be others who truly would like to do the same thing. Therefore, I am asking for those of you who are blessed with a group that formally studies books from our Reading Program to get me the information I requested so that I may share it in our next newsletter. Although sometimes we have no other alternative, it is good to remember that our Reading Program was "not meant to be completed alone or in a vacuum". Our national site encourages us to share the Reading Program, help others get books, display a progress chart in your group, pray about issues that you have read about that concern you and most importantly, advocate for real change that address the social justice issues you have read about.

Besides sharing the requested information, I hope to do a book recommendation and review in each future column. I also invite you to join me at the Program Resources Table at our Day Apart and Annual Meeting as well as at the WOC Spring Retreat and Annual Celebration (you will find the dates in this newsletter). Until then, keep on reading, sharing, praying and advocating and taking action!

Glory! What do we mean when we say "glory"? Glory be! Glory to the newborn King." "Mine eyes have seen the glory." "She was dressed up in all her glory." "All glory, laud and honor..."

It's one of those words that I've used and especially sung a lot throughout my lifetime. And, it's also I word I used without thinking much about its meaning. Or, that it has so many different uses.

Glory Happening by Kaitlin Curtice is on the UMW reading list this year. We are using this book with new deaconess and home missioner candidates as they prepare for consecration at General Conference in May. To understand the book, I thought I'd better understand "glory"!!

In the introduction, Curtice unpacks what glory means to her. By definition it means "magnificence, great beauty." For her, it is also "the essence of God, the kind gift of Spirit in Jesus."

The book includes stories and prayers of her life where she find that essence of God in every day happenings: from experiences as a young mother, in relationships, in the first green shoots of vegetables growing on her balcony, even in sickness when all she could do was reach out for help from friends to sustain her. And, it's a lot about community and how we see God in in each other. Glory! The presence of God every moment of every day.

I've connected with many of her stories and, even more, have been more aware of glory moments in my own life. Glory! The brilliant red of a cardinal in a snow-covered tree. Clearly God's n magnificence. Glory! The good news from the surgeon that my sister's surgery was a success and that she can anticipate healing. Glory! The beautiful drawing by my friend PJ that she titled "Hope." Glory! Sitting with my feet firmly planted on the ground and feeling God's presence in this moment even as I write this article.

If you enjoy the reading program, I commend to you this book as one of your selections. Even if you don't, I encourage you to stop frequently in you day to think about where you have observed glory happening around you – where are you finding the Divine in everyday places.

"Jesus. You call us into holiness, deep and flowing and good, and we find ourselves allowed into a deeper kind of living than we've ever known before.

This is a statement residents would say as they saw signs placed by our team in their yards as they visited their Hurricane-torn homes after Katrina in New Orleans and city officials came quickly to determine their needs. Yes, this Mission Trip I participated in with 22 others opened my eyes to how our Mission work stimulates policy makers and others to ACT. This kind of action is so important as we continue to affect Climate Change.

Climate change affects everyone, however, it does not affect everyone equally. The poorest people in industrialized and developing nations suffer the worst effects of the buildup of greenhouse gases in our atmosphere. Women and children comprise an estimated 70 percent of the world's poor. United Methodist Women calls for stewardship of the earth and sound relationships within and between communities, whether local, state, national, or international work. We work to provide practical, theologically sound tools to guide and inspire your work, to create a healthier environment. UMW will continue to live into the 13 Steps to Sustainability which provides concrete ways to counter climate injustice through our own event planning and daily habits.

Let's practice Galatians 6:9- Let us not grow weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up.

Community Development for All People - January 2020

- Parents/grandparents/ guardians registered 500 children for the Christmas Store. On December 21, they chose about \$100 worth of new toys and clothing for these children assisted by 150 elves.
- **ID program** from the Leadership Academy has proven beneficial to many. They are providing the money and transportation for all people to secure their birth certificates and/or picture ID. These documents are needed to secure jobs, housing, social services, entering school, etc. They have raised \$25,000 and have assisted with over 600 applications. This happens every Monday from 11-2 at CD4AP.
- **All People Podcast** has completed more interviews of community members. Go to CD4AP website or www.4allpeople.org/allpeoplepodcast.
- Of the 500 pregnant women and families who have established relationships with CD4AP, all babies have celebrated their First Birthday!! Now CD4AP is expanding to Thrive to Five. This program's goals are to encourage parents to be their child's first teachers, support families on the birth to kindergarten journey with their child, and if needed, assist with securing appropriate assessment. The projected outcome is the children arrive at kindergarten ready to learn. Presently over 50% of the 5 year olds on the South Side of Columbus enter kindergarten one year behind and are never able to make-up the difference. Nationwide Children's Hospital is a partner in this endeavor.
- After School at Lincoln Park has begun its ninth year with 65 scholars in grades
 1-6. We now have scholars who are enrolled in college and/or employed! After School has expanded to Seibert Elementary with 35 scholars; Seibert has the English Language Learners program on the South Side of Columbus.
- Of the twelve counties served by Mid-Ohio Food Bank, the **Fresh Market** is the largest which Mid-Ohio serves and is one of the largest 10 Fresh Markets in the United States! On the average, the number has grown to about 500 shoppers per day. This shows that poor people DO want to eat healthy. Store members (presently below the poverty line) have a membership card. Food is donated by Mid-Ohio Food Bank, some area Kroger's, and Walmart/Sam's Club. Open five days a week Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. **Grocery plastic bags are needed. Drop off at Fresh Market.**


